## A Brief History of Jews In the Mohawk Valley

In 1778, the Village of Utica was incorporated. The first Jew to call Utica home was Abraham Cohen, who came from Poland in 1847. By 1848, there were enough Jews to form a minyan, holding services at the home of Max Levy. Congregation Beth Israel was founded on October 1, 1848 with 20 families.

Jews continued to come from Eastern Europe (mostly Poland) between the 1870s and 1920s as the Erie Canal and the railroads made Utica a transportation hub and manufacturing center. In the early years, Jews were peddlers who sold their wares to isolated farmers, miners, and loggers without access to essential goods. The peddlers later branched out into wholesale, manufacturing and, in 1900's, retail establishments that lined Whitesboro Street. In the 20th and 21st centuries, doctors, lawyers, and other professionals joined those who already called Utica home.

In the early 20th century, the Jewish community continued to thrive, establishing fraternal lodges, a YMHA and YWHA, a Workmen's Circle (1892), Hadassah (1917) and the Zionist Organization of America (1938). The Jewish Community News covered their activities.

Although Temple Beth Israel did not survive, it was succeeded by Zvi Jacob (Orthodox) in 1870; Temple Beth Joseph in Herkimer which grew from the Hebrew Aid Society (1915); Temple Beth El (Conservative) in 1919; and Temple Emanu-El (Reform) in 1950. The Jewish Community Center opened in 1955. The most recent additions are Chabad of Clinton and Chabad of the Mohawk Valley.

Although the population of Jews has declined, as has the overall population of the Mohawk Valley, the Jewish community here remains vibrant.

## Mohawk Valley Jewish Hall of Fame

In addition to the inaugural celebration of JEWTICA, the JCC is proud to announce the establishment of The Mohawk Valley Jewish Hall of Fame. This Hall of Fame will recognize those Jews with a connection to our region whose contributions to the Jewish people of the Mohawk Valley, the United States, or the world are notable, significant, or otherwise deserving of such recognition. Today we are honored to enshrine the very first member of this body, **Deborah Lynn "Debbie" Friedman**.

Debbie was a self-taught singer-songwriter, born in Utica, whose music in words and melody spread throughout Jewish worship. Thousands of youngsters at Jewish summer camps across the country learned her songs and integrated them into their religious observations. Congregations of all stripes added her works into their liturgy. *The Forward*, a Jewish newspaper, called Debbie "the Joan Baez of Jewish song." According to her obituary in *The New York Times*, she was known "for her clear, strong voice and for the intense spiritual conviction with which she sang as she accompanied herself on the guitar." Debbie passed away in 2011 at the age of 59 in California.
